#### **National Consistent Collection of Data**

All Australian schools are required to participate annually in the NCCD.

The national data collection reflects and supports the ongoing work of schools. The NCCD draws on teachers' professional judgement and practices throughout the year supporting students with disability to access and participate in education on the same basis as other students. Under the NCCD model, teachers and school staff use their professional, informed judgement, based on evidence, to determine the level of adjustment students with disability receive, in both the classroom and whole of school context, as well as the broad category of disability that relates to the adjustments.

The model for the NCCD is based on mandatory obligations to students under the national *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* (DDA) and *Disability Standards for Education 2005*. Understanding these legal obligations and the NCCD model is essential knowledge for principals and teachers.

#### **Attendance**

All students are required to be at school every day the school is open. Of course, illness cannot be helped. As the cold weather hits, so do the winter bugs. It's often hard to know whether to send your child to school or let them stay home to recover, especially when that means an adult cancelling work. For safety's sake, if your child seems unwell you should always keep them home from school and seek medical advice. School A to Z and the NSW Health have created an at-a-glance chart to help answer your questions about common childhood illness and how long sick kids need to miss school. It is essential that if your child is absent from school, you send a note in with them on the day they return explaining the absence. A page with the school's 'Absentee Explanation Note' has been attached to this newsletter and can be used by parents to inform us of absences. These notes can also be found on the school website under notes or in the front office.

The other requirement of the Education Act, is that students are at school on time every day. Our school day commences at 9:15 am and as such all children need to be here by this time to commence morning routine. Your assistance with this is greatly appreciated.

Dear families of KE,

Here we are in Term 2 of schooling, our students are halfway through their first year of school and probably like you, I can't believe it! Importantly, we are all travelling along with smiles on our faces as we progress with learning!

This term, we will continue to embark on exciting learning journeys! Our students are progressing very well with their reading and writing capabilities. Many are questioning throughout writing and talking about their ideas. This is music to my ears! Students are working like clockwork through routine events which not only shows how focused they are on their learning, but that they are enjoying learning also....

Again, a joy for me as their teacher

This term, we have been looking at various materials and their properties during Science lessons. If anyone has any handy scraps of fabric, hessian, vinyl or wool that they don't need at home... we would love to use these in our classroom as we experiment with these materials!

Mathematically, our students are working hard on learning their 'friends of 10,' counting in 10s (on and off the decade) and how sharing and multiplying affects numbers. Our Reading groups are great opportunities for students to practice writing words they know and improving on reading familiar and unfamiliar words. New literacy activities are proving that learning is fun in kindergarten.

Our Library lessons with Mrs Basak have been very exciting also this term! We are using technology to design homes that we can print on our school 3D printer! Kindergarten Emu students are using 'Tinkercad' to design and print little houses! These lessons further support our History lessons, where we are learning about family structures and the differences that can exist in families, not only now, but from the past also. These opportunities in Library are equally amazing for supporting our STEM learning (Science Technology Engineering and Mathematics).





Creatively, we've begun artist appreciation in our class. Last week, we learnt who Vincent Van Gogh was and how he painted. We learnt some interesting facts about his life and works and completed our very own interpretations of his beautiful and well known artwork, 'Sunflowers.'



Most of our students are continuing their learning journeys at home with short homework tasks, home reading and writing of camera words. I'd like to encourage more families to support students where possible with home learning tasks. Being an active listener and supporter with home reading, encouraging the reading and writing of camera words, working on our home/school internet programs (Reading Eggs and Mathletics) are Kindergarten Homework tasks. The connection with learning through school and home really is beneficial for our young students.

## **Italian**

#### Welcome all Parents and Carers to Week 7



This term has been a very busy one for all the students involved in the Italian Program and they have enthusiastically participated in their Italian studies throughout the whole term.

Kindergarten finished off learning about feelings and are currently learning how to count to ten in Italian. They have learnt the numbers through interactive board activities, games and songs.





1/2 Ocelot have moved on from learning the body parts, to using them in sentences. The students have learnt to recognise whether the body parts are masculine or feminine, as well as singular or plural, in order to complete sentences correctly. It was very pleasing to note that the children are understanding this concept as it is something that does not occur in English.

3/4 Orangutan have been learning about "The Home" and are now concentrating on describing what furniture is found in each room of the house.

5/6 Albatross are progressing through a unit regarding their daily routine.

Currently the class is creating a comic strip of their day, incorporating 24 hour time.
